# Woodloes Primary Scores Big in Promoting Lifelong Physical Literacy! By Miss Cirin



At Woodloes Primary School, we have been especially proud of all the children, who have embraced PE and the opportunities that we offer them towards life-long physical literacy - the ability to move with competence and confidence in a wide variety of physical activities in multiple environments that benefit the healthy development of the whole person. We are very proud of the range of opportunities that we offer the children.

Every class has one PE session per week with professional coaches. This is throughout the whole school, from our pre-school - Saplings - through to Year 6. This year, we have set up a Year 5 and 6 girls' football team, which has encouraged girls who had never thought about playing football to get involved! We have then taken part in competitive matches and tournaments, with all of the girls being given an opportunity to play. The growing teamwork, resilience, and skill they are developing is a pleasure to watch.

Not only have we taken part in Inter-school athletics events, where the children have showcased their athletic talents, it has also allowed the children the opportunity to be a team player and be supportive of other schools and also give them encouragement.

We are very aware of our school context and relish the opportunity to bring in external visitors, which allow children to access sports and experiences they otherwise may not have been able to. This year, this has included archery, fitness circuits, Personal Best challenges, orienteering challenges, dance and free-dance sessions. Alongside this, we offer a range of lunchtime and afterschool clubs, including dance, gymnastics, judo, football and multi-sports.

Through assessment, we have identified those children in KS2, who are not yet secure in their fundamental skills and offer them booster sessions during lunchtimes with a professional coach to build those skills.

To support children with being physically active for at least 60 minutes during the school day, we have purchased a range of playground equipment, including table tennis tables, basketball hoops and tennis nets and equipment, with playground pals, to ensure that playtimes and lunchtimes are active times.

Our most recent external visitor was Felix Clements, a PE teacher who appeared on BGT and was a semi-finalist in 2023. He shared his passion for dance, which all of the children and adults also shared, having learnt to do a break-dancing routine, along with his fantastic attitude to life, reminding us all that you always need to challenge yourself to be the best you can be.

We have many more events to look forward to before the end of the academic year, including free-style footballer Ash Randall - Guiness World Record holder - coming to visit us, sports day, dance sessions. a colour run and skipping sessions, as well as continuing everything else to ensure that we give our children the best starting point to ensure life-long physical literacy.

At Woodloes, we strongly believe that "Education is for improving lives and leaving your community and world better than you found it." and continue to strive to achieve this.

The winner will be decided by public vote. The two teams that made it through are 'Mrs. Shirley King - The Shirleys - Polesworth School' and 'Mrs. Shirley King - The Chosen Ones - Polesworth School.' The winning team will have their concept brought to life, a fantastic opportunity for Polesworth students.

The schools' competition required the young participants to recognise the importance of **listening to and engaging with others**, rather than pursuing a singular route that only recognises one argument.

The young people have worked very hard to produce their ideas for soundscapes with visuals which capture a local unsung hero. This is what they were asked to think about:

1. Why this specific unsung hero?2. Is their idea and the information clear?3. Is it an imaginative idea?

# Chadsmead Primary Academy and our work to support Social, Emotional and





Chadsmead Primary have successfully worked closely with the Schools Work Trust over several years. The trust's mentoring project - 'Engage Youth Mentoring' has 25 trained volunteer mentors working in ten local primary schools to support social, emotional mental health needs both of a group and individual basis. Currently Chadsmead has three trust volunteers working within our school providing weekly 1 to 1 support for children that require additional support to build positive relationships, raise self-esteem, gain confidence or who simply benefit from time with another adult to overcome barriers, provide a safe space to talk and share their thoughts and ideas and to create a positive sense of wellbeing and trust.

The trust has supported Chadsmead previously providing well-being workshops, mental health workshops and this year, is providing a transition workshop with ex pupils from the local high schools who can positively talk about and share their experiences of high school with Year 6. In addition, the charity has also bought to Chadsmead its 'Shepherd's Crook Puppet Team' to perform their interactive play6 'Carols and Kings' based on the Three Wise men and the Epiphany at Christmas; Children in Year 4 visited Wade Street Church at Easter to take part in a drama performance and undertake Easter themed activities that provided and members of the Trust also work closely with Mrs Dennis our Religions and Worldview leader on Friday lunchtimes with our 'Urban Saints' groups, where members of the organisation provide a welcoming place for young people to meet with their friends, make new friends and take parts in social skills based activities whilst eating lunch together.



Together with our school's local offer for social, emotional and mental health provision, the Lichfield Christian Schools Work Trust helps Chadsmead Primary meet the needs of our pupils and provides them with additional support and opportunities to help them on their life journey. Their support at Chadsmead has immensely benefitted our more vulnerable children and been crucial to supporting and developing their self-esteem as well as individual needs within our school.

# Stoneydelph Primary School's Elephant Sculpture Shines in Community Art Project!



From 1st July to 8th September, the streets, parks, and open spaces of Lichfield, Tamworth, and Sutton Coldfield will be adorned with over 60 beautifully designed elephant sculptures. This stunning display features 30 large elephants crafted by both local and national artists, ranging from well-known favourites to emerging talents. Additionally, you'll find more than 40 mini elephants, each designed by local schools and community groups.

Stoneydelph Primary School is thrilled to participate in this project with their own baby elephant sculpture, lovingly designed and decorated by the pupils. Every child in the

school submitted a design for the competition, and the winning entry was created by Ruby-May in Year 5. Her design beautifully incorporated the school's values and the motto "grow and achieve."

A team of Year 5/6 pupils brought Ruby-May's design to life on the sculpture named "Forget-Me-Not," with every child in the school adding their fingerprint to the final piece. The result is a true work of art that embodies the spirit and creativity of the entire school.

The pupils at Stoneydelph Primary School named their elephant "Forget-Me-Not" as a tribute to those we have loved and lost, aligning with one of their core values: being 'community champions.'

This project also honours St Giles, an organization that has provided immense support to families in the school, particularly around bereavement.

The creativity displayed by the pupils during the design process has been remarkable, and the finished sculpture incorporates contributions from every child at Stoneydelph Primary School.

The school eagerly anticipates seeing "Forget-Me-Not" on the trail this summer and sharing it with their families and the wider community.

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# Cheers for Mr. James! National Recognition for Football Champion of Telford and Wrekin

Grange Park Primary School are thrilled at the national recognition for their very own Mr James!

Lee James sent a detailed application to the English Schools' FA to nominate his school for the Special Recognition Award, due to the huge amount of footballing activity they host. He copied his Headteacher into the email, who in turn replied to the ESFA along with another member of staff, to say that it was Lee himself that should be nominated as none of the activity would go ahead if it wasn't for him and his dedication to football across Telford.

Lee launched a girls' football programme at Grange Park School in 2014 and, after seeing how much the pupils were enjoying it, he reached out to other schools in the local community. In 2014 he instigated the first Telford & Wrekin girls' 5-a-side tournament, with only 6 of the 61 invited schools in attendance. Since then, he has worked with other colleagues within the district to promote the girls' game and to create girls' 7-a-side football leagues.

The league entries have grown from just 17 teams in 2017 to 49 in 2023 and has led to girls developing their love for the game and filtering through to play for district representative sides and beyond. Lee's dedication to schools' football, particularly for girls, has led to over 2,500 girls playing regular, competitive football within Telford & Wrekin. He has also hosted 2 ESFA Premier League Primary Stars (previously Kickabout) tournaments in his area, always registers his school for the ESFA Panini Classroom Challenge activities and throws himself into

Schools' Football Week activity every year.

He makes football fun and accessible, not just for children at his school but throughout the whole district, supporting and creating not just local, but also national ESFA activity. **Such a well-deserved nomination! Good luck at the Awards Evening on Saturday 15<sup>th</sup> June at Villa Park!**

# The Wilnecote School Shines in National Intermediate Mathematical Challenge by

Wilnecote School students are celebrating an impressive performance in the Intermediate Mathematical Challenge (IMC), a prestigious national mathematics competition.



The IMC, aimed at students in years 9 to 11, tests their mathematical problem-solving skills with a challenging multiple-choice format under timed exam conditions.

Wilnecote School entered 30 students into the competition, and their hard work paid off. A remarkable two students achieved gold certificates, placing them among the top 8-9% of participants nationwide. Five students secured silver certificates, and a further eight earned bronze. Additionally, fifteen students received participation certificates for their commendable effort.

The school is particularly proud of its year 9 students who made the significant step up from the Junior Mathematical Challenge to the more demanding Intermediate level.

Special recognition goes to Joey C, who achieved the highest score in year 10, and Kai W, who not only topped year 9 but also emerged as the school's overall champion.

Mr Mulhall and the entire mathematics department at Wilnecote School congratulated all participants for their dedication and success. They highlighted the students' achievement not only in terms of their mathematical prowess but also in demonstrating the maturity and resilience required to compete at such a high level.

The school looks forward to reporting on the upcoming Junior Mathematical Challenge results later this year. This early success in the Intermediate Mathematical Challenge bodes well for Wilnecote's aspiring mathematicians.

# The Polesworth School Year 7 Aspire Class Masters Atomic Structures by Mrs Broome

The Year 7 Aspire class has been delving into the fascinating world of electronic structures.

Using atomic structure kits, students have been constructing detailed models of elements from the periodic table. They calculate the number of subatomic particles—protons, neutrons, and electrons—for each element, adding protons and neutrons to the nucleus and applying electron shell filling rules to determine electron configurations.

This hands-on approach has made complex concepts more accessible and engaging, allowing students to visualize atomic structures and understand the properties of different elements. The excitement is palpable as they piece together the fundamental components of matter, fostering curiosity and a deeper appreciation for the microscopic world.


I have also worked with third sector regulated organisations that have involved the Quality Care Commission and Ofsted, so firsthand experience of the regulatory framework and requirements.


